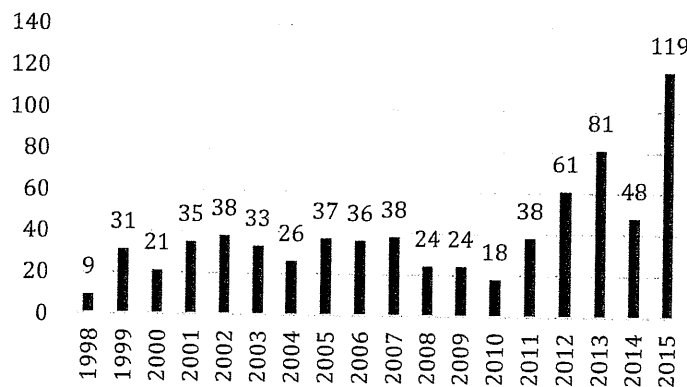
Dear Sen. Capito,

IBM urges you to support funding for K-12 computer science education in the FY 2017 Labor Health and Human Services, Education and Related Agencies Appropriations bill.

With just one out of four schools in the United States offering computer science, we are not doing enough to align the skills taught by our education system with today's job market.

Unfortunately, West Virginia reflects the poor alignment of education and jobs found across the nation. Last year, a total of 119 students took the AP Computer Science test in West Virginia. Yet, Monster.com lists over 1000 Software Jobs in West Virginia as of this week.


Number of West Virginia Students
